The Centre County Historical Society operates the Centre Furnace Mansion as an historic house museum. The Mansion is open to the public for tours and library use on Wednesdays, Fridays, and Sundays from 1:00 to 4:00 p.m. and by appointment. The Society's hours of operation are Mondays through Fridays from 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m.

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Founded in 1904, the Centre County Historical Society (CCHS) is the oldest and largest history organization in the county, serving as the official historical society of Centre County. It is a community and volunteer based non-profit educational organization that works collaboratively with local, regional, county, and state organizations in helping to preserve and promote the area's historic, cultural, and natural resources.

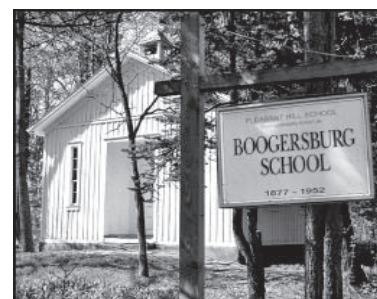
CCHS is headquartered in the Centre Furnace Mansion, a restored and furnished ironmaster's home listed in the National Register of Historic Places. This historic mansion and nearby iron furnace stack represent the 18th-century beginnings of the charcoal iron industry in this area, and the 19th-century beginnings of Penn State University, originally located on furnace lands. The site offers more than eight acres of landscaped grounds and gardens.

CCHS disseminates historical information about Centre County; offers programs and exhibits of historical and cultural interest for children and adults; marks and helps preserve and protect the Centre Furnace Mansion property and grounds, our newly acquired Boogersburg School, and other historical sites and landscapes in Centre County; maintains a collection of artifacts, books, manuscripts, maps and photographs; and publishes and promotes interest in historically significant publications relating to Centre County.

Society members and others in the community are invited to support these activities by contributing to the Centre County Historical Society Endowment Fund, managed by the Centre County Community Foundation.

Mansion Notes is published as a benefit of membership in the Centre County Historical Society, which is made possible through the Keatley Fund.

The Centre County Historical Society (CCHS) is a nonprofit, tax-exempt organization, under Section 501(c)(3) of the I.R.S. Code. Donations are tax deductible. President's Corner

With the end of 2010 appearing ever more persistently on the horizon, a brief CCHS look backward and then another one forward. They provide some significant current and future images.

First, a recap of the past:

- 2010 began at Centre Furnace Mansion with this large house having a sagging back ell and porch, and chimneys that needed serious re-pointing and repair. Approximately \$50,000 in funds were needed to make it happen. Through your generous support, along with a matching PHMC Keystone Grant and a grant from the Central PA Visitors & Convention Bureau, CCHS was able to acquire the necessary funds to complete the repairs and return the "Dowager" to her former degree of health and stateliness.
- The Boogersburg School and grounds also have received financial support to begin a replanting of the acre that adjoins the school, and to provide a brochure that tells the story of the Boogersburg site. CCHS, with sincere appreciation, received funds from the Lumber Heritage Region and from the State College Branch of AAUW to proceed with these two initiatives.
- More than 150 area volunteers gathered at the Mansion and school in October, as part of the United Way Day of Caring. They built paths, painted the mansion, and cared for the gardens and grounds (including planting and trimming trees), in a remarkable demonstration of community support and involvement.

Why are these sites important? They serve as a link with the past, but they also provide an opportunity to compare and better understand Centre County today. Hundreds and hundreds of adults and children who visit the mansion and school each year are able to step back in time to experience 19th century architecture, customs, furnishings and fabulous gardens at the mansion, and to sample time spent in an early one-room schoolhouse.

Telling the story and highlighting the importance of other historic sites and landscapes also has been part of CCHS's activities each year, and during 2010 the narrative ranged across Centre County from the Spring Creek Canyon (Benner Township) to the Peale Tunnel (Rush), from McCoy Dam (Spring) to Scotia (Patton).

And now to the future:

Major goals are to continue to maintain and improve the Society's properties, to tell the story of Centre County through enhanced educational opportunities, and to help preserve its historic and cultural richness through more programs, more publications, and more exploration of Centre County's historic landscape.

These goals become attainable only through the community's support. Maintaining two 19th-century properties and making them available for public involvement is, of course, a challenge. While CCHS has benefited from funding through the commonwealth and other granting sources in the past, those funds are becoming increasingly rare, and support from the Historical Society's membership will become more and more essential.

We will be mailing out membership renewals soon and sincerely hope you will continue to be part of the vitality of CCHS, the county's oldest and largest history organization. In addition to your own support, we hope you will consider inviting others to join or to provide them with gifts of membership for this holiday season.

Thank you so much for your role in being a Centre County ambassador.

Keystone Grant Update Mansion Restoration is Complete!

September marked the completion of almost a year of work on the Centre Furnace Mansion. The project began with the meticulous restoration of the chimneys, provided by **Brian Bastress** and the crew from **Bastress Stone Works**. The shoring up of the Mansion's ell and restoration of the covered porch was carried out under the thoughtful guidance of architect **Art Anderson**, structural engineer **Bob Barnoff**, and especially through the careful oversight of project manager **Chuck Heilig** of **Poole Anderson Construction**. Our historic columns on the porch were sensitively rehabilitated by **Frank Stroik** of **The Country Homestead** in Kreamer, PA.

These projects could not have been done without funds from the PHMC's Keystone Grant, the Central PA Convention & Visitors Bureau and the support of Historical Society members and friends.

Lumber Heritage Region DCNR Grant

A Lumber Heritage Region grant has allowed CCHS to begin work on greening the acre adjacent to the school, making the site more suitable for school field trips.

However, we would like to recognize that the grant came to us at a cost to another historic site. Grants very often come with the condition that the amount must be matched by the recipient. The Pennsylvania Heritage Areas Program had to redistribute this grant because matching funding fell through for a project to install sandstone pillars to mark the Depression-era Civilian Conservation Corps Camp at Salt Lick. Therefore, we are especially thankful for the opportunity to put this funding toward a site that benefits area children.

The beginning of the planting took place on the Day of Caring and will resume in the early spring. Materials for the water line will be purchased using this grant and we thank **Glenn O. Hawbaker** for committing to donate the labor and equipment. Stay tuned for updates!



News from Boogersburg School By Sharon Childs

This fall, the Boogersburg School hosted a variety of programs and activities, in addition to the regular tours for area schoolchildren. Most recently, 45 participants in the Leadership Centre County program visited the schoolhouse as part of their History Day to learn of the school's history, restoration, and current contributions to Centre County. Just prior to their visit, a docent training was held for new and continuing volunteers. The small but dedicated and amazingly enthusiastic group had a lively exchange of ideas for how to engage children in an authentic one-room schoolhouse experience.

On an entirely different note, you may recall reading an article in the previous Mansion Notes announcing the award of a grant from the Lumber Heritage Region. This grant is funding the beginning stages of a landscape plan for the schoolhouse grounds and the adjoining acre of land. Under the direction of Professors Martin McGann and Dan Stearns of Penn State's Landscape Contracting program, senior-level students **Kyle Pearman**, **Chris Lisiecki**, **Dustin Stoner**, **June Cunningham**, and **Zach Miller** developed a landscape plan for the property. Work outlined in the plan will revitalize and restore the land and help it once again relate to the original property. The plan incorporates a natural setting that includes several interpretive possibilities using native trees, shrubs, meadow areas, and paths to provide a place for children and adults to learn and enjoy. With the expert guidance of **Holly D'Angelo** and **John Allegar**, of neighboring **Fox Hill Gardens**, and Master Gardener **Suzanne Thompson**, we proceeded with the initial stages of the landscape plan on the United Way's Day of Caring. Many wonderful volunteers from RSVP, the Retired and Senior Volunteer Program, scrubbed the interior of the schoolhouse from top to bottom, stained picnic tables, removed invasive plants, and planted native and other trees and shrubs on the property. This coming spring, additional landscaping plantings will be installed, and **Blaise Contino**, of Boy Scout Troop 367, will be working on his Eagle Scout project to include the coordination of more plantings and a pedestrian bridge that will join the school to the new acre.

Inventory of the Centre Furnace Mansion's Collection

It is time again to take inventory at the Centre Furnace Mansion. Inventory – a list of acquired objects that must be physically located within the museum – is an important activity for the maintenance of object security and preservation, as well as the museum's legal accountability. CCHS tries to conduct a complete inventory of the museum's collection every two or three years.

Yvonne Templeton and I have been working on the project since September. So far, we have updated the location and condition of objects on the mansion's first floor. This relatively simple, yet time consuming, task is a big help for the staff because it will allow them to easily keep track of and schedule repairs for collection items. In addition to a basic inventory check, our goal is to update the Society's database. At the completion of our project, all of the collection's objects will be included in the database and accompanied by a photograph in order to facilitate easy access for CCHS staff and patrons. Our efforts this year will benefit the operation of the Centre Furnace Mansion for years to come.

Thursdays in the Gardens

When we celebrate Christmas with family and friends, we have the Victorians to thank for many of its joyful festivities and delightful customs. They revived old traditions, such as caroling, and invented new ones, such as sending Christmas cards. Santa Claus and Christmas crackers became very popular during Victorian times. They turned to nature for inspiration and found fresh, rich greenery, flowers, pinecones, berries, and fruit, which were all used to create colorful displays.

Here in Centre County, early in December, the Thompson family most likely would have begun decorating, covering every available inch of the mansion with greenery. Spruce, balsam, laurel, cedar, ivy, mistletoe and holly graced tables, banisters, chandeliers, archways, columns, and woodwork. Mistletoe dangled from the ceiling of the entry hall. Even picture frames and mirrors were wrapped with evergreen rope. Wreaths could be found hung on doors or behind windowpanes.

With the Victorian spirit in our hearts, the CFM Gardeners festively decorated Centre Furnace Mansion. In addition to decorating outside, the gardeners decorated the Hearth Room tree in natural materials, carrying on a tradition initiated by Lois Smith many years ago.
